Geology Group

It has been a busy summer for the geology group with a series of field trips to a variety of locations around our area. Whilst a number of trips have been very local, we have also visited Big Pit near Abergavenny and the Forest of Dean coal and iron ore mining region.

Big Pit is part of the National Museum of Wales and well worth a visit. Besides the opportunity to descend into a deep mine, there are interesting museum exhibits and displays describing the processes involved in coal mining. We began the trip to the Forest of Dean at the New Fancy Viewpoint, the location of one of the old deep mines. Here, there is a geomap which represents the geology of the whole Forest of Dean mining area, as well as a memorial to the miners who lost their lives working in the mines. Amazingly, there were around 100 different mine locations, both coal and iron ore in the Forest of Dean.

During the summer, a small group of members were involved in a job to clear and re-expose a local site which was due to be visited by members of an International geological meeting. The site was an SSSI near the village of Eckington which had been established as being one of a number of terraces of the Avon deposited between 130,000 and 115,000 years ago when the climate was generally a little warmer than today. In this context, a terrace might be likened to a river beach. In earlier studies, this terrace had proven to be very rich in fauna, principally small molluscs but interestingly also having produced evidence of the presence of Hippopotamus in the region.

The work consisted of hacking back a mass of brambles before a face about 2m wide and 2m deep could be excavated. Once through the top soil there were layers of sand and gravel of varying consistency. It was interesting to find that one of these layers included a huge number of small, mainly broken, fossils. However, the most exciting find was something that the resident expert of the day thought was part of a hippopotamus tusk (see photo).

We are pleased that about 30 new people have signed

up to the group for this year and hope to welcome them to our special new members' introductory sessions as well as the start of a seven part lecture series starting in October. We are always open to new members, so if you are interested, come along to one of our meetings or send me an email. Grania's 85th Birthday Celebration

Malvern U3A member Grania Joinson celebrated her birthday in June this year by doing a sponsored skydive in support of St Richard's Hospice in Worcester. On the following pages you can read her vivid account of the experience. The photograph below was taken by Grania's son Tim, and shows her with skydive instructor Simon and video photographer Richard.



I should have done my Sky Dive in aid of St Richards Hospice in Worcester on 8th June, the date of my 85th birthday, but the atrocious weather meant no flying and cancellation. I re-booked for the following Sunday. Tim, my very kind son, was my 'team' for the day. We left Malvern at 7am to go to an airfield near Banbury, Oxfordshire.

The weather was not encouraging; grey with heavy cloud but not raining. After signing in and weight recorded, we were briefed about equipment, parachutes and harness etc. We were also drilled in the few movements we would need to do. Most important was lifting our feet and lower legs before landing, to avoid breaking our ankles and those of our instructor. Feet hitting the ground too fast is the biggest danger in Sky Diving.

Then we waited for the weather to improve. At around 11.30 we were all asked decide either to wait for a 50/50 chance of a flight later on or re-book for another day. We chose to stay and were relieved to see that more than half decided to leave, which meant if flying did start I was more likely to get a place.

About 12 pm we were told that flying would commence. I was lucky because I was in the second flight and could watch the first and note roughly how long it took the plane to reach 13,000 feet and before the first divers appeared from out of the clouds. I had to get into my jump suit and be fitted for a helmet with goggles and harness. Under my harness I proudly wore a tee shirt showing that I was being sponsored in aid of St. Richard's Hospice. I met my instructor Simon, to whom I would be attached later on. He was very friendly and relaxed and we shared a few jokes. We made our way out to the plane, heart thumping more in excitement than fear.

In the plane we sat astride long benches on each side. Simon was behind me and my video photographer Richard in front. Simon kept checking and tightening my harness, like the starter checks girths of horses before a race! Richard reminded me to smile and relax and enjoy myself when out among the clouds! It was a small plane carrying about a dozen people - divers, photographers and instructors. Three of us were doing tandem dives. Others were old hands going up for a jolly, equipped with their own individual parachutes.

Then the cabin lights started to come on. Red: goggles down, get ready, Amber: door opened, Green: first of the independent jumpers was out, followed by two more and Richard. Then it was my turn! I was sitting in the doorway before I knew it and Simon gave me an almighty shove and I was tumbling towards a lovely big white fluffy cloud and thinking a nice soft feather bed to fall into! Helpfully the cloud blocked out any sight of the land far below. Next thing as the wind roared around me I caught sight of Richard valiantly trying to get photos and remembered to produce some sort of smile. There was a reduction in pace. Calm and serenity was restored.

Simon showed me where to hold the guide ropes and I was in charge, steering the 'chute slightly left and right. Needless to say control was handed back for landing. The ground still looked some way off, but we were going quite fast so had to hurry to lift lower legs and feet up and out of the way. On reaching the ground a man on either side grabbed me and kept me upright in a very controlled manner. It took a few moments for me to regain my balance. My harness was loosened and then it began to sink in what I had done - and what I had achieved!

I walked over to Tim and gave him a big hug - no doubt he was feeling relieved that I was down in one piece! As we were having refreshments a bit later, the fourth and last flight took off, and although it was blustery the wind became stronger. We waited to see parachutes in the sky but it was too rough to let them jump and so the poor things came back down in the plane. What a disappointment for them.

CONCLUSION: I really had no idea of the huge interest generated by an 85 year old doing a first Sky Dive until so many people, complete strangers, came over to congratulate me and shake my hand! A challenge for me and a triumph for St Richard's Hospice, as my fund has raised £3,000. My thanks to all who donated so generously to the Hospice. Thanks to Alison and Jodie, the Hospice Fundraisers, who put up with endless phone calls and questions and encouraged and helped me all the way.
