

Wine Tasting Group

Thirteen Group members converged on a secret location in Malvern in December for a sumptuous four-course meal served by waiters wearing spotless white gloves. The wines were "The Best of the Best" – the ten wines that scored the highest at meetings of the Group during 2019.

We began with an aperitif: Exquisite Cremant du Jura 2016 from *Aldi* that attracted high praise at our June Barbecue. This was followed by two white wines: Ormarine 2017 Picpoul de Pinet from *Aldi* that scored 8.5 at the May meeting and Root 1:



Chilean Sauvignon Blanc 2018 from *Morrisons* that scored 8.0 at our July meeting. These accompanied the starter which was Smoked Salmon & Asparagus Terrine.

There then followed an interlude during which two red wines were sampled. They were an Aluado 2018 Alicante Bouschet from *Laithwaites* that scored 8.8 at our April meeting and an Opi Malbec Reserve 2018, also from *Laithwaites* that scored 8.6 at the April meeting.

To accompany the Roast Lamb Shank served with Port Wine Jus, Mashed Sweet Potato, Sprouts, Roast Parsnips and French beans there was a *Wine Society's* Californian Old Vine Zinfandel 2017 that scored 9 at the March meeting, and a Vacqueyras 2016 Domaine Grand Montmirail from *Waitrose/Yapp Bros* that scored 8.5 at the May meeting.

With the Raspberry Crème Brulee Dessert came a Passito di Pantelleria from *Lidl* and a Rubis Tempranillo from *Aldi*. The latter had accompanied the puddings at the June Barbecue and been much appreciated.

A selection of English, Welsh and Italian Cheeses completed the gastronomical extravaganza. These were accompanied by an Armilar 10-year-old Tawny Port.

At the end of the evening we looked forward to a New Year filled with new viticulture discoveries.
